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WELLBEING

Kia Ora Whanau,

I am extremely happy to have been appointed a lead role for the wellbeing of our tamariki at Maunu school this year. A focus on wellbeing means a move towards more flourishing children. Strategies include supporting children to cultivate positive feelings; develop positive behaviours for learning; and build positive ways of thinking.

We want to help our tamariki understand and express their emotions, recognise their strengths and learn ways to be resilient to cope with challenges. This is known as POSITIVE EDUCATION, applying the wellbeing science of positive psychology in our kura.

We are a <u>Positive</u>, <u>Behaviour for Learning</u> (PB4L) school, we also work with our students using <u>Pause</u>, <u>Breathe</u>, <u>Smile</u> strategies.

Positive Behaviour for Learning - PB4L

At Maunu we use the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) initiative to define, teach and reinforce our Five Feather Values- Respect, Responsibility, Excellence, Integrity and Curiosity.

PB4L is an evidence-based framework that looks at behaviour and learning from both a whole-of-school, and an individual student approach. It provides schools with a process for teaching social and behavioural skills and helps to develop a positive, proactive, and systematic approach based on school data. It takes the approach that opportunities for learning and achievement increase if:

- the school environment is positive and supportive
- expectations are consistently clear
- students are consistently taught expected behaviours
- expected behaviours are consistently acknowledged

inappropriate behaviours are consistently responded to in a fair and equitable way.

Around the school you may notice posters and charts displaying our expected behaviours in the different areas. These behaviours and skills are explicitly taught throughout the year, focusing on a different area each week.

This week's focus has been Behaviour in the Playground, with taking turns as one of the behaviours being explicitly taught so that students know what it is and how to take turns. This may seem simple but a child needs to know what is expected.
