

Backing Our Schools and Our Tamariki

The Maunu School Board of Trustees has been notified by NZEI that union members intend to strike next Thursday, **23rd October**. Teachers across Aotearoa will be taking part in **NZEI Industrial Action**. While **Maunu School will be closed for instruction on this day**, we will remain **open for supervision**. If you are an **essential worker** and have **no other childcare options**, please complete the **Google Form attached** no later than 5pm, Tuesday 21st October.

Please note Maunu Educare, (After School Care) will NOT be open on this day.

At its heart, it's about protecting the quality of education for our tamariki and ensuring that teaching remains a profession that people want to enter and choose to stay in.

Teaching is a vocation. Every teacher I know gives their heart and energy to their students - often long after the bell has rung. However, the demands on teachers have increased significantly over recent years. New proposed rules around additional "call back" days, for example, add to an already full workload and take away valuable personal and family time. Combined with growing administrative requirements, evolving curriculum expectations, and professional learning demands, these pressures are stretching teachers thin.

We are also seeing more children beginning school who are not yet "school ready." Many present with neurodiversity, additional learning needs, or complex behaviour that requires time, planning, and support. Our teachers approach this with compassion and skill, but the resources to meet these needs have not grown at the same pace. Despite this, they continue to show up every day, nurturing, inspiring, and guiding our tamariki because they believe deeply in the power of education and the potential of every child.

We also understand that families face increasing pressures, with both parents often working and less time available to contribute to school life. The "village" that once surrounded our schools has become harder to sustain. But now, more than ever, we need to stand together in partnership - school, whānau, and community, to ensure our tamariki receive the very best. At Maunu School, we are immensely proud of our teaching team. Their dedication goes far beyond lessons; it's about shaping confident, compassionate, capable young people who will contribute meaningfully to their world.

As the NZEI action takes place next week, I ask that we hold empathy at the centre, for our teachers, for our tamariki, and for the bigger picture of what keeps our education system strong. Supporting our teachers means supporting our children.

NZ REFRESH – SUPPORTING SMOOTH TRANSITIONS

At Maunu School, we place great importance on ensuring that every child's transition into our kura is smooth, supported, and positive. Relationships come first, with the child firmly at the centre of the partnership between teachers and parents.

This focus reflects the refreshed **New Zealand Curriculum (Te Mātaiaho)**, which places **ākonga at the heart of learning** and highlights the importance of **whanaungatanga (relationships)** and **manaakitanga (care and respect)** as foundations for effective pedagogy. When relationships are strong and reciprocal, children experience a genuine sense of belonging - an essential condition for wellbeing and learning.

Current research into transitions (Education Review Office, 2021; Peters, 2010) emphasises that children are more likely to experience success when there is continuity between home and school, and when teachers intentionally build on each child's prior knowledge, identity, language, and culture. This aligns with our approach at Maunu School, where **partnerships with whānau** ensure that each child feels seen, valued, and celebrated for their unique strengths.

By working together, we create an environment where our tamariki feel confident, connected, and ready to thrive. Smooth and supported transitions are not simply a process of starting school - they are the beginning of each child's lifelong learning journey, grounded in trust, care, and strong relationships.
